Over a period of six months between January and June 1973, Fellini shot the Oscar-winning *Amarcord*. Loosely based on the director's 1968 autobiographical essay *My Rimini*, [59] the film depicts the adolescent Titta and his friends working out their sexual frustrations against the religious and Fascist backdrop of a provincial town in Italy during the 1930s.
